


Newsletter Winter 2023-24

Autumn 2023: *The Pirates of Penzance*Wednesday 13th September – Saturday 16th September 2023



The Savoy Theatre, Monmouth

Our show for the fall of 2023 was Gilbert and Sullivan's swashbuckling sensation *The Pirates of Penzance*, and true to form we left no swash unbuckled, cunarder unscuttled or handspike unshipped! At the helm, Adrian Bevan won the very medal for a debut directorial, absolutely killing it in the roles of actor, director and choreographer – huge congratulations to both him and co-director Domi Walker, who took command whenever mutiny threatened to break out over staring too long at the empty space where Frederic should be... Musical director Ruth Friend and accompanist/repetiteur Helen Stidolph stood undaunted and laughed in the face of ten-part harmonies as they

led us to musical victory, while Adam Wells kept the entire production ship-shape and scurvy-free from behind the scenes in a triumphant debut as stage manager.

The entire cast and crew really pulled together to get the show on the water; a brave group turned out one hot summer morning to defy the sun and paint the scenery. Three stone walls, a handful of gravestones, two poplar trees, and seventeen choruses of 'We Represent the Lollipop Trees' later, and we had a spectacular set to go a-pirating on! Each performance proved even more raucously fun than the last for all involved, with every single person going all-out. In addition to Adrian as a not-quite-21 but still spectacularly spry Frederic, newcomer Holly Thody enchanted audiences and castmates alike as Mabel with her ethereal high notes - we're pretty sure her ornamentation in 'Poor Wand'ring One' almost made it to space! Back playing Ruth for a second time with MMT was veteran opera singer Katie Ellis, whose comic timing had audiences rolling with laughter every night, and who formed a delightfully mischievous trio alongside scheming Pirate King Meriwether Maturin (affectionately described by one audience member as "Lord Flashheart, as played by Adam Ant") and Helen Keef as the hilariouslyinebriated first mate Samuel (whose incredibly cursed Spoonerisms will live rent-free in our brains for the rest of time). Our model Major General was Chris Godwin, who immediately won theatregoers over with his immense wit and even more immense moustache, while Philip Chant – another newcomer – gave a strong debut performance keeping the rest of us in line as the Sergeant. Not forgetting, of course, our amazing ensemble, who all worked immensely hard to conquer the crunchiest harmonies Gilbert and Sullivan could muster, and racked up overtime mastering their sword-, truncheonand/or parasol-work! (An honourable mention also goes to the many, many swords and truncheons that gave their lives during our more energetic rehearsals.)

Our audiences were treated to a rollocking good time – some really got into the spirit of the high seas and even turned up in costume, with our youngest honorary pirate being only four years old! We received many lovely comments from audience members: one said, "The singing and acting was superb. The direction was so comprehensive, but

natural. It was a pleasure being there." From another: "An utterly engaging performance... spellbinding, fabulous, funny and a joy to watch." And even: "A well-produced and -presented musical. The best G&S I have seen!" We even received a glowing review in the *Ross Gazette*, who called the show "Simply swashbuckling!" (If you'd like to read the whole article, you can find it here.) This coming spring we're pressing pause on political correctness as we stage Lerner and Loewe's *My Fair Lady*: a "smashing, positively dashing" lark around Victorian London that's sure to make you shout, "Get me to the theatre on time!"

Returning after her triumphant debut as Mabel in our fall show *The Pirates of Penzance*, Holly Thody is Eliza Doolittle: a poor, Cockney flower seller who just dreams of a big chair, a warm fire, and a whole lot of chocolate. But when phonetics professor Henry Higgins (Adrian Bevan) boasts to his friend Colonel Pickering (Steve Banner) that he could pass her off as a duchess with a little tuition, Eliza challenges him to put his money where his mouth is. A bet is made, and the three embark upon a tempestuous experiment in language and etiquette. Eliza's ne'er-do-well father Alfred (Haydn Holder) and his disreputable drinking buddies Harry and Jamie (Philip Chant and Meriwether Maturin), recognising an opportunity to buy a Lot of Beer when they see one, can't believe their "little bit of luck."

In the ensuing shenanigans, a horse's arse gains Eliza an adoring stalker in Freddy Eynsford-Hill (Matthew Bryant), an unspecified plain somewhere in Spain gets particularly soggy, and Higgins' long-suffering housekeeper Mrs Pearce (Sheryl Westoby) tries to keep her employer alive long enough to present his "squashed cabbage leaf" to the Queen of Transylvania. Will the trio get away with their high society ruse, or will the meddling of Higgins' mother (Gay Rogers) and former student Zoltan Karpathy (Nick Thompson) "do them in?"


Making sure the cast say their vowels correctly is acclaimed director Jane Rodgers, who took home NODA's Outstanding Production award for her last MMT show, *The Sound of Music* in 2022. Also returning are the dream team of musical director Ruth Friend and accompanist/repetiteur Helen Stidolph, and with our Lords of the Backstage Steve Brettle and Adam Wells joining forces as co-stage managers, we can be sure that even if Doolittle doesn't make it to the church, the church will get to DOOLITTLE on time!

So join us at the Savoy as we ask the real questions: Why CAN'T the English learn to speak? WOULD Pickering be wounded if Higgins didn't send him flowers? And if a mouthful of marbles was necessary for Demosthenes, is it ALSO necessary for Eliza Doolittle? The one thing we do know is that there are only two safe topics: the weather, and everybody's health.


